What's New in SAS/STAT 15.1

This presentation reviews highlights of SAS/STAT 15.1. New development areas include causal graph models for causal analysis (the CAUSALGRAPH procedure), restricted mean survival time regression for time-to-event data (the RMSTREG procedure), and generalized linear mixed-effects models for Bayesian analysis (the BGLIMM procedure). Other notable enhancements include modeling pharmacokinetics with the NLMIXED and MCMC procedures, semiparametric proportional hazards models to interval-censored data with the ICPHREG procedure, and conditional distribution analysis with the QUANTREG procedure.

Introducing the BGLIMM Procedure

SAS/STAT® 15.1 includes PROC BGLIMM, a new, high-performance, sampling-based procedure that provides full Bayesian inference for generalized linear mixed models. PROC BGLIMM models data from exponential family distributions that have correlations or nonconstant variability; uses syntax similar to that of the MIXED and GLIMMIX procedures (the CLASS, MODEL, RANDOM, REPEATED, and ESTIMATE statements); deploys optimal sampling algorithms that are parallelized for performance; handles multilevel nested and non-nested random-effects models; and fits models to multivariate or longitudinal data that contain repeated measurements. PROC BGLIMM provides convenient access, with improved performance, to Bayesian analysis of complex mixed models that you could previously perform with the MCMC procedure. This paper describes how to use the BGLIMM procedure for estimation, inference, and prediction.



Fang Chen is a Director of Advanced Statistical Methods at SAS Institute Inc. Among his responsibilities are development of Bayesian analysis software and the MCMC procedure. He also oversees software development in various mixed models, nonlinear models, causal inferences, survival analysis, Bayesian hierarchical models, and discrete choice models. Before joining SAS, he received his PhD in statistics from Carnegie Mellon University.

A Short Introduction to Logistic Regression

Logistic regression is one of the basic modeling tools for a statistician or data analyst. This talk introduces the binary logistic regression model, then continues with topics including: testing goodness of fit, scoring new data, polytomous response modeling, and computing on a grid.

Bob Derr is a Principal Research Statistician Developer with the Advanced Analytics Division at SAS. He has been at SAS since 1994, and received his PhD from the Statistics Department at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1999. Bob supports the LOGISTIC, HPLOGISTIC, and MULTTEST procedures, as well as the LOGSELECT procedure and logistic action in SAS Viya.

An Introduction to the ODS Destination for Word

The SAS® Output Delivery System (ODS) destination for Word enables customers to deliver SAS reports as native Microsoft Word documents. The ODS WORD statement generates reports in the Office Open XML Document (.docx) format, which has been standard in Microsoft Word since 2007. The .docx format uses ZIP compression, which makes for a smaller storage footprint and speedier downloading. ODS WORD is preproduction in the sixth maintenance release of SAS 9.4.

This paper shows you how to make a SAS report with ODS WORD. You learn how to create your report's content (images, tables, and text). You also learn how to customize aspects of your report's presentation (theme and styles). And you learn how to enhance your report with reader-friendly features such as a table of contents and custom page numbering. If you're cutting and pasting your SAS output into Microsoft Word documents, then this paper is especially for you!

ODS Destination for Excel: Top 10 Frequently Asked Questions

The SAS® Output Delivery System (ODS) destination for Excel enables customers to deliver SAS reports as native Microsoft Excel documents. The ODS EXCEL statement produces output that is ready for Microsoft Excel 2010 or later. ODS EXCEL is production in the third maintenance release of SAS 9.4.

ODS EXCEL is widely used by SAS customers, some of whom contact SAS Technical Support with questions and issues. SAS Technical Support staff maintains a list of the most frequently asked questions about ODS EXCEL. This presentation will cover the Top 10 items in the list.

Have you ever wondered how to place a background image in your worksheet? Encountered a memory issue while generating a large workbook? Struggled to assign the correct format to your numeric data? If so, you are not alone! This presentation will give you answers to these and other frequently asked ODS EXCEL questions.



David W. Kelley is Principal Software Developer in the group responsible for Base SAS® reporting and the Output Delivery System (ODS). He is the author of the ODS WORD destination, which is new for SAS 9.4M6. David is also the author of PROC DOCUMENT, and has supported PROC TABULATE since SAS 8.0.
